What is the PE and Sport Premium for primary schools?

The government has provided additional funding to improve provision of physical education and sport in primary schools in England. This is known as the Primary PE & Sport Premium. Schools must spend the additional funding on improving their provision of PE and sport, but have the freedom to choose how they do this.¹

What funding has been received by Wilbarston C of E Primary School in 2022/2023: £16,780

How has the funding been spent and what has been the impact?

Action	Actual/Forecasted Cost	Impact and Sustainability
Pacesetter Sports clubs/ Upskilling for staff	£3,325	We have had Pacesetters in to teach classes once a week. This has enabled staff to be upskilled and as a result, teachers have gained confidence in teaching PE. We hope this will help sustain the quality of PE teaching going forward.
Gymnastics Club (Pacesetter Sports)	£950	This is a very popular club for both boys and girls which has increased pupil participation in sport. Children are motivated by the awards they work towards. This club is part funded by parents. We hope that the enthusiasm for gymnastics will help children to attend other school sports clubs going forward helping children to an active lifestyle.

Supply cover for PE meetings and PE Co- ordinator time out of class	£100	This has allowed opportunity for collaborative work on physical education with other schools in the MAT. The PE co-ordinator has attended termly meetings to arrange fixtures, write policies, review curriculum delivery and organise new opportunities. Children's participation in sports has increased through the MAT inter-school sports competition and festival calendar. Events throughout the year include: multi-skills festival, cross country competition (2 events), swimming gala, dodgeball festival (2 events), tri-golf festival, archery festival, futsal tournament and athletics competition. Beyond the immediate physical benefits of taking part in such events, the children have also developed their personal and social skills within a sporting context, including participating and competing alongside children from different primary schools within the area.
Transport	£1,000	Transport by coach to allow children to every child the opportunity to participate in competitions and events, including: tri golf, athletics, swimming gala, cross country, Year 6 post SATs sports celebration event.

Play leader salary	£3,800	This has paid for an extra member of staff to support children at lunchtimes with physical activities such as tennis. We hope that this will sustain pupils being active at lunchtimes and they will have a range of modelled games to play going forward.
PE equipment	£1,500	This has paid for new equipment in line with our new PE scheme. This has included a new archery set, golf, badminton, tennis, football and basketball sets. This has enabled staff to teach quality PE with the correct equipment.
Playtime equipment	£500	This has paid for a large range of equipment to increase physical activity during lunchtimes and playtimes. This has included bouncers, balancing beams, new bats and balls, skipping ropes and games.
Forest school equipment	£1,000	This has been spent on forest school equipment to start forest school such as tools, outfits, a fire pit, cooking materials and plants and trees. Children are engaging in weekly sessions of forest school for 2 hours a week. There has been an increase in wellbeing, concentration, fine motor and gross motor skills and confidence amongst the children.
